
FUTURE


GETTING AROUND

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




HISTORICAL VILLAGES

After visiting the mask museum and an impressive Confucian school, proceed to Andong where you will spend the night in a traditional Hanok home. Renovated for the convenience and safety of their guests, these houses still retain their historic beauty, offering an authentic cultural experience of Korean life in previous centuries.

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ENJOY NATURE



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LOCAL SPECIALTIES



HISTORY

GYEONGBOKGUNG PALACE

A symbol of the Joseon Dynasty's prosperity, it is the largest of the Five Grand Palaces, built in the heart of 14th-century Seoul, and restored after two Japanese invasions.

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JOGYESA TEMPLE

Built in 1395, it stands as the main temple of the Jogye Buddhist Order. It welcomes many visitors drawn by the stunning Daeungjeon Hall and the 500-year-old white pine tree.

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BUKCHON HANOK VILLAGE

This incredibly well-preserved historic village is a living work of art, allowing travelers to fully immerse themselves in Korea's bygone times.

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CHANGDEOKGUNG PALACE

Translated to "Prospering Virtue Palace", it retains many elements dating from the Three Kingdoms of Korea, gracefully blending in with the natural topography.

ANDONG

Laid back and surprisingly welcoming, Andong is a destination worth visiting for the myriad of historical sites that surround it. Known for its regional specialties, as well as the strong soju liquor, this city offers a glimpse into an authentic Korean lifestyle.

HAHOE VILLAGE

A worthy UNESCO World Heritage Site, Hahoe Folk Village holds a mystical beauty. This clanbased settlement seems untouched by time and the preservation efforts have been remarkable. Following the Pungsu-jiri (Korean feng shui) guidelines, the village is shaped like a lotus flower.

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BUYONGDAE CLIFF

Just outside Hahoe, this 200 ft. cliff offers incredible bird's eye views of the village, thus bearing the ancient Chinese name of lotus.

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HAHOE MASK MUSEUM

Not only a great exposition of Korean tradition, this museum displays a vast collection of masks from many parts of the world along with the traditional Hahoe.

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BYEONGSANSEOWON CONFUCIAN ACADEMY

Nestled between the river and the hills, this Confucian academy radiates peace and stillness due to its airy layout and typical architecture.









JEONJL

A slower paced destination compared to the bustling Seoul or Busan, Jeonju knows how to enjoy the simple pleasures in life. A city with an artistic soul and great nightlife, it stands amongst the favorite destinations for Koreans. A must-see destination for foodies, Jeonju boasts an astonishing culinary scene with great street food, high-end restaurants, and the typical makgeolli (unfiltered rice wine) bars.

Commonly used as a base while exploring the surrounding attractions, Jeonju is easily accessible from all the major cities by train; however, our preferred method of transportation is booking a private car, driver, and guide.

GYEONGGIJEON SHRINE


The shrine presents the traditional motifs found throughout South Korea. An airy layout following the guidelines of Pungsu-jiri, the roofs are covered by the typical black tiles and the exterior showcases the beautiful contrast between the earthy red and turquoise green colors. This sanctuary commemorates the founder of the Joseon era, King Tae-jo, along with his wife. In the museum, many portraits of successive kings are showcased.





JEONJU HANOK VILLAGE

With over 800 traditional homes, the Jeonju Hanok Village offers an exceptionally immersive experience. To really encapsulate the bygone era, visitors can enjoy the relaxed atmosphere while strolling through the village wearing a traditional hanbok outfit, indulge in the regional cuisine, and spend a night in one of the historic houses.



HAEINSA TEMPLE STAY

HAEINSA TEMPLE

The serene Haeinsa – Temple of the Ocean Mudra – is home to the famous Tripitaka Koreana. Counting exactly 81,352, these wooden printing tablets represent the world's oldest and most comprehensive Buddhist scripture, with 52 million flawless Chinese characters. Due to impressive efforts, not one tablet has been damaged in over 760 years. Located in the Gayasan National Park, the stunning mountainous scenery complements the peaceful aura that engulfs the temple.

TEMPLE STAY EXPERIENCE

Enjoy the unique privilege of spending 2 days at the temple. As a cultural experience designed to educate people on Korean Buddhism, it is open for everyone regardless of religious belief.

During this stay, engage in Seon mediations, monastic meals, and a variety of programs that will broaden your understanding of Buddha's teachings. Above the temple, visit the peaceful hermitages where many great old monks reside.



GYEONGJU

YANGDONG VILLAGE

A beautifully preserved village of South Korea, Yangdong is a fine example of traditional Korean architecture and Confucian aesthetics. The picturesque ambiance is best described on misty mornings, when the sun starts to illuminate the 4 spines of Mt. Seolchangsan, and a divine silence reigns over all.

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On the slopes of Mt. Tohamsan, this imposing 6th century temple harbors many national treasures, such as 2 stone pagodas, stunning bridges and, among many other, the bronze Buddha of Enlightenment.

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Part of the Bulguksa Temple, visit this grotto that showcases one of the best Buddhist sculptures in the world, along with stunning sunrise views over the East Sea.

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Once an exotic garden filled with beautiful flowers and rare animals, Donggung Palace is now home to an exhibition with over 700 priceless historical relics.

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These abrupt rolling hills hide many secrets!
Discovered in 1973, this royal burial complex comprises 23 tombs, with each one containing thousands of incredible artifacts.

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Enjoy a relaxing day hiking along through the scenic Namsan Mountain, home of countless temples, Buddha stone carvings, and pagodas.





prosperous times.




CULTURE

Marvel at the castle-like tower of Seongsan Ilchulbong Peak and the many other concave land formations throughout the island, before reaching Jusangjeolli Cliff or Yongmeori Beach in wait for that perfect sunset.
